Cub Scouts (ages 7-10)

Is a year-round program designed to meet the needs of youth and their families through fun and challenging activities designed to promote education, character, and physical development. Cub Scouts: 443 Packs: 19

Is an outdoor program created to develop character, citizenship, and fitness in youth.

Is a program for young men and women designed to help young adults grow into responsible and caring adults through education and recreational experiences.

#### **Camp Mountain Run Programs**

The Bucktail Council owns and operates one camping facility for Scouts and the benefit of the community. Camp Mountain Run is used to supplement the programming of a local unit. This camp offers programs that, because of terrain and natural resources, offer a challenge to our Scouts.

During the formative years, the program operated with no established facilities or owned equipment. Other camping programs were developed through the use of leased equipment. The success of this pilot program led to the Bucktail Council to launch a capital campaign to raise the necessary funds to purchase equipment for the new Camp Mountain Run program.

Today, Camp Mountain Run is a coeducational aquatic and camping adventure of a lifetime offering a combination of experiences throughout the state. It is a complex that includes a wide variety of boats, aquatic equipment, study facilities, lodging facilities, a dining area, climbing facilities, camping equipment, and an experienced staff. The camp operates on a full twelve-month schedule. In addition to summer programs offered to Scouts, Camp Mountain Run serves as a conference center for adult leaders of Scouting and other related not-for-profit agencies.

The camp also serves Scouting's membership living within a 500-mile radius with short-term programs conducted on weekends. The camp makes an excellent location for this type of year-round activity. Elementary school children from surrounding communities participate in one and two-day environmental workshops held at the camp during the school year. These children are served in addition to the more than 700 Scouts and Scouters during the summer months.

To support these various activities, Camp Mountain Run maintains several permanent structures. The current facilities include a pool, trading post, a nature building, a state of the art campsite for seasonal staff, a maintenance facility, ranger's residence, a citizenship building, administration building and a warehouse building used for equipment issue and storage. There is also a dining hall that houses the kitchen and dining room. In addition, there are also several cabins for weekend stays.

The outdoors is where the Scouting program thrives!
